Laburnum Primary School

Charging and Remissions Policy



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1. Aims

Our school aims to:

- Have robust, clear processes in place for charging and remissions
- Clearly set out the types of activity that can be charged for and when charges will be made

2. Legislation and guidance

This policy is based on advice from the Department for Education (DfE) on <u>charging for school activities</u> and <u>the Education Act 1996</u>, sections 449-462 of which set out the law on charging for school activities in England. Consideration has also been given to <u>The Education (Charges for Early Years Provision) Regulations 2012</u>.

3. Definitions

- Charge: a fee payable for specifically defined activities
- Remission: the cancellation of a charge which would normally be payable

4. Roles and responsibilities

- **4.1 The governing body:** The governing body has delegated responsibility for approving the charging and remissions policy to the Finance and Resources Committee. Monitoring the implementation of this policy has also been delegated to the Finance and Resources Committee.
- **4.2 Head Teacher:** The Head Teacher is responsible for ensuring staff are familiar with the charging and remissions policy, and that it is being applied consistently.
- **4.3 Staff:** Responsible for implementing the charging and remissions policy consistently, and notifying the Head Teacher of any specific circumstances which they are unsure about or where they are not certain if the policy applies. The school will provide staff with appropriate training in relation to this policy and its implementation.
- **4.4 Parents:** Expected to notify staff or the Head Teacher of any concerns or queries regarding the charging and remissions policy.

5. Where charges cannot be made

Below we set out what we cannot charge for:

5.1 Education

- Admission applications
- Education provided during school hours (including the supply of any materials, books, instruments or other equipment)
- Education provided outside school hours if it is part of:
 - The national curriculum
 - A syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
 - Religious education
- Instrumental or vocal tuition, for pupils learning individually or in groups, unless the tuition is provided at the request of the pupil's parent
- Entry for a prescribed public examination if the pupil has been prepared for it at the school
- Examination re-sit(s) if the pupil is being prepared for the re-sit(s) at the school

5.2 Transport

- Transporting registered pupils to or from the school premises, where the local authority has a statutory obligation to provide transport
- Transporting registered pupils to other premises where the governing body or local authority has arranged for pupils to be educated
- Transport that enables a pupil to meet an examination requirement when he or she has been prepared for that examination at the school
- Transport provided in connection with an educational visit

5.3 Residential visits

- Education provided on any visit that takes place during school hours
- Education provided on any visit that takes place outside school hours if it is part of:
 - The national curriculum
 - A syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
 - Religious education
- Supply teachers to cover for those teachers who are absent from school accompanying pupils on a residential visit

6. Where charges can be made

Below we set out what we can charge for:

6.1 Education

- Any materials, books, instruments or equipment, where the child's parent wishes him or her to own them
- Optional extras (see below)
- Music and vocal tuition, in limited circumstances
- Certain early years provision, such as nursery lunch sessions and nursery hours in addition to the statutory entitlement to 15 hours (or 30 if eligible) funded childcare for eligible 3 and 4 year olds.
- Community facilities

6.2 Optional extras

- We are able to charge for activities known as 'optional extras'. In these cases, schools can charge for providing materials, books, instruments or equipment. The following are optional extras:
 - Education provided outside of school time that is not part of:
 - The national curriculum
 - A syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
 - Religious education
 - Examination entry fee(s) if the registered pupil has not been prepared for the examination(s) at the school
 - Transport (other than transport that is required to take the pupil to school or to other premises where the local authority or governing body has arranged for the pupil to be provided with education)
 - Extended day services offered to pupils (such as breakfast clubs and after-school clubs)
- When calculating the cost of optional extras, an amount may be included in relation to:
 - Any materials, books, instruments or equipment provided in connection with the optional extra
 - The cost of buildings and accommodation
 - Non-teaching staff
 - Entrance fees to museums, castles, theatres etc.
 - Insurance costs
 - Teaching staff engaged under contracts for services purely to provide an optional extra (including supply teachers engaged specifically to provide the optional extra)
 - The cost, or an appropriate proportion of the costs, for teaching staff employed to provide tuition in playing a musical instrument, or vocal tuition, where the tuition is an optional extra
- Any charge made in respect of individual pupils will not be greater than the actual cost of providing the optional extra activity, divided equally by the number of pupils participating.
- Any charge will not include an element of subsidy for any other pupils who wish to take part in the activity but whose parents are unwilling or unable to pay the full charge.
- In cases where a small proportion of the activity takes place during school hours, the charge cannot include the cost of alternative provision for those pupils who do not wish to participate.
- Parental agreement is necessary for the provision of an optional extra which is to be charged for.

6.3 Music tuition

- Schools can charge for vocal or instrumental tuition provided either individually or to groups of pupils, provided that the tuition is provided at the request of the pupil's parent.
- Charges may not exceed the cost of the provision, including the cost of the staff giving the tuition.
- Charges cannot be made:
 - If the teaching is an essential part of the national curriculum
 - If the teaching is provided under the first access to the Key Stage 2 instrumental and vocal tuition programme
 - For a pupil who is looked after by a local authority

6.4 Residential visits

We can charge for board and lodging on residential visits, but the charge must not exceed the actual cost.

7. Voluntary contributions

As an exception to the requirements set out in section 5 of this policy, the school is able to ask for voluntary contributions from parents to fund activities during school hours which would not otherwise be possible.

Some activities for which the school may ask parents for voluntary contributions include:

- Educational visits
- Residential visits
- Transport provided in connection with an educational or residential visit
- Cooking / baking

There is no obligation for parents to make any contribution, and no child will be excluded from an activity if their parents are unwilling or unable to pay.

If the school is unable to raise enough funds for an activity or visit then it will be cancelled.

8. Activities we charge for

The school will charge for the following activities:

- After School Sports Clubs: Places are allocated on a first come, first served basis and booked online using the PMX: ParentMail system. Charges are made at the point of booking and places cannot be reserved without payment. If a pupil withdraws from the club a refund will only be given if their place is taken by another child.
- Breakfast Club
- Nursery: Lunch Session
- Nursery: Additional Session. A parent/carer will only be allowed to purchase additional hours once the universal entitlement of 15 hours has been allocated and any extended entitlement hours have been allocated. Sessions will be allocated on a first come basis and no guarantee can be made that a parent will receive the days or session times they request.

Parents will receive an invoice for the breakfast club and/or nursery sessions monthly and will be expected to pay this by the due date. Childcare Vouchers or Tax-Free Childcare can also be used to pay for these sessions/hours. Due to staffing costs incurred in relation to booked places, charges will still be applicable should your child be absent for whatever reason.

For regular activities, the charges (Appendix 1) for each activity will be determined by the governing body and reviewed in June each year. Parents will be informed of the charges for the coming year in July each year.

Activities arranged by a third party: None of the provisions of these policies will apply in those instances where a third party levies a charge direct on parents in return for services provided in accordance with the terms of Section 118(4) of the Act.

9. Remissions

In some circumstances the school may not charge for items or activities set out in sections 6 and 8 of this policy. This will be at the discretion of the governing body and will depend on the activity in question.

9.1 Remissions for residential visits

Parents who can prove they are in receipt of any of the following benefits will be exempt from paying the cost of board and lodging for residential visits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided that Working Tax Credit is not also received and the family's annual gross income does not exceed £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on (this is paid for 4 weeks after an individual stops qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Universal Credit (if the application was made on or after 1 April 2018, the family's income must be less than £7,400 per year – after tax and not including any benefits)

9.2 Remissions for children in receipt of the Pupil Premium Grant (PPG)

Where appropriate, PPG may be allocated at the discretion of the Head Teacher to replace, partly or in whole, any voluntary contribution or charge made to the parent or carer of a pupil in receipt of the grant. Pupil Premium expenditure is summarised in the termly Head Teachers report to the Governing Body.

10. Monitoring arrangements

The Head Teacher and The Office Manager monitor charges and remissions, and ensures these comply with this policy. This policy will be reviewed by the Head Teacher and The Office Manager every 3 years. At every review, the policy will be approved by the Finance and Resources Committee of the Governing Body.

Appendix 1: Specific Charges

| Nursery: Lunch Session | 11:45-12:15 | Staffing costs | £1.80 |
| Nursery: Additional Session | 8:45-11:45, or 12:15-15:15 | Staffing costsResources | £10.80 |
